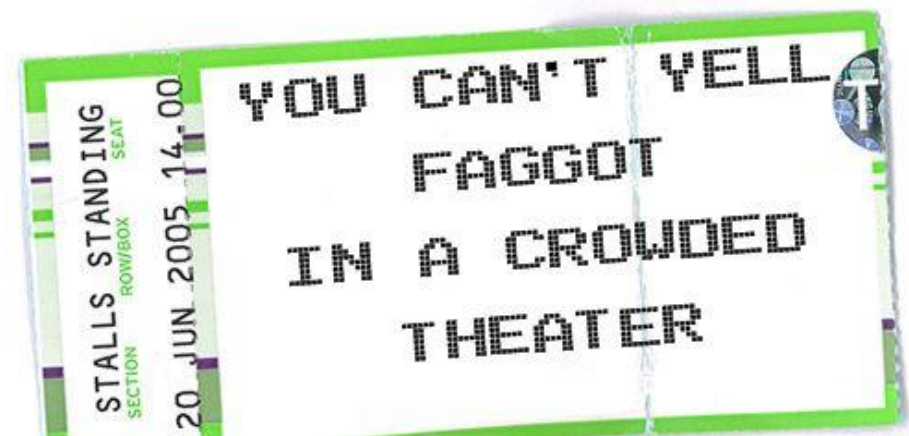

YOU CAN'T YELL FAGGOT IN A CROWDED THEATER

The harbor of hate speech in the gay community.

Carl Joseph Walker-Hoover, Springfield, Massachusetts.

Dead. Age 11. Cause of death: suicide.

Jaheem Herrera, Decatur, Georgia.

Dead. Age 11. Cause of death: suicide.

It's unimaginable. Children taking their own lives. What could possibly drive elementary-school kids to feel and act upon such profound pain?

Language. It was incessant, bullying hate speech about perceived sexual orientation, something these two boys should have had the freedom and time to explore at their own pace. It's commonly known that gay teens are 2 to 3 times more likely to attempt suicide, but even GLSEN (Gay/Lesbian/Straight Education Network) begins their statistical gathering at age 13. We're ill-equipped to deal with these recent deaths because of their unthinkable nature.

On March 8, John Evans was brutally beaten in Midtown. At age 28, he literally had his teeth kicked out. Atlanta's gay community has been debating the virtues of this assault to determine if we can call it a hate crime. With no actual hate crime laws on Georgia's books, we must qualify it ourselves. I have. Easily. With one word: "faggot." John told media outlets, "They called me the f-word." It's moving that his southern gentility prevents him from saying it. He has a unique perspective on its hurtful power and he's right. We shouldn't allow it. But since that time, John has been repudiated in various blogs; because he was also robbed, people are audaciously questioning the merits of the crime perpetrated against him. John now says, "I feel the gay community is sometimes its own worst enemy. I have had to deal with other gay men telling me I got what I deserved. I just hope one day our community can really unite and join forces."

On December 3, the acting manager of The Plaza Theatre on Ponce DeLeon Avenue in Atlanta hollered “faggots” at two young gay African-American men, one of them a teenager, who arrived there by mistake. They’d driven all the way from Macon to see the film, “Noah’s Arc: Jumping The Broom,” playing a couple of blocks away. Their request for directions was spurned with hate speech. Luckily, tiona m, a Philadelphia-based African-American lesbian filmmaker, was sitting in the lobby during her documentary’s showing there and overheard it. She was so incensed by what she heard and the theater owner’s dismissal of the incident that she conducted her film’s post-screening Q&A session on the cold, windy sidewalk outside. Fifty people stood with her, including my wife and me. Many of us had tears in our eyes. To date, no action has been taken against the offending employee, and the theater’s owner, through public message boards, has alleged and alluded that the *three* gay people involved are liars.

On May 28, Atlanta’s LGBTQ film festival, Out On Film, begins a weekend-long run at The Plaza Theatre. When asked to consider the verbal assault of December 3, the festival’s new director didn’t see a problem with awarding them this multi-thousand dollar booking, citing pleasant experiences renting their facilities in the past. But he’s not spending his own money to do this; he’s spending community money generated by our donations, sponsorships, volunteer efforts, and ticket purchases. Let him and Atlanta Film Festival, the straight-helmed financial funnel for Out On Film, know that this venue is unacceptable and that hate speech will not be tolerated nor financially rewarded in our community. The lives of our children may depend on it.

MISSISSIPPI DAMNED

Damned & Redeemed: Tina Mabry's Ascension To Cinematic Brilliance

Mississippi Damned is fresh on the film festival circuit, but this tour de force has already won both the Jury Award for Best American Independent Film at **The Philadelphia Film Festival** and the Special Jury Award for Narrative Breakthrough at **The Atlanta Film Festival**. Scheduled to appear at many other major film festivals throughout the summer, this is the earliest of interviews with the woman behind it, writer/director **Tina Mabry**.

XANNA DON'T: *This is your first narrative film and you based it on your life growing up in Tupelo in the late 1980s and '90s. It's a brutally honest, challenging drama about a quest that you described at the film's post-screening Q&A in Atlanta as "escaping a mindset" and "creating a road when you don't have a map." Was it difficult to convey so much of your life within the scope of a film?*

TINA MABRY: It's an extremely difficult process trying to collapse a lifetime into two hours while aiming to create character arcs, plant plot points, and craft an emotionally engaging story. I tried to incorporate my entire past into the first draft because I wanted to address all of the major milestones that shaped who I am today. But I tried to tackle too many issues for a single script. The producer and editor, **Morgan Stiff**, was able to help me with its direction and intent. Her dramaturgical background was an asset as she helped me focus the story and fully develop the characters. From an emotional standpoint, it wasn't easy to write about what I had witnessed while growing up. The film brings tabooed issues to the forefront, which seems to construct a safe environment for many audience members to confess their family secrets. One audience member in Atlanta who returned for a second screening told me that after she and her aunt watched the film, they finally talked about the molestation that occurred in their family. It's gratifying to know that the film has allowed audience members to have an open dialogue and realize they have no reason to be ashamed.

XD: *You confessed that the character of Kari, a young pianist with great potential, most resembles you, but conceded that some characters were composites for dramatic purposes. How much of you identifies with the character of Leigh, her much maligned, manic lesbian sister?*

TM: Leigh is based on my older sister, who had a difficult time growing up as a lesbian in Tupelo. She was treated like a pariah. I remember telling her that I was gay too, but she thought I was just a kid doing my best to make her big sister feel better. She didn't know that I was actually coming out to her.

XD: With Morgan, you have formed your own production company, Morgan's Mark. You define your relationship as "partners professionally and personally." How do you balance the two relationships? Can you describe the dynamic of a lesbian couple creating films together?

TM: It's always a challenge. There's a natural inclination to talk to each other on a personal level, which doesn't always translate well into the professional arena. When we work together, we constantly remind ourselves to interact as if we were merely co-workers, sometimes censoring ourselves by adjusting the way we phrase things to one another. In our personal life, we are candid and frank in our discussions, but that can pose a problem in our professional relationship. However, the beautiful thing about working with your partner is that you never have to worry about trust or honesty. We always know we have each other's best interest at heart and have the same goals. Morgan brings out the best in me.

XD: Many of your relatives depicted in the film saw it over the holidays, just before its January debut at Slamdance in Utah. Was it difficult for you to watch together as a family? Has it facilitated any healing with its truthfulness?

TM: I was nervous and hesitant to show them the film. I didn't want to cause a rift because I chose to publicly reveal the dirt we swept under the rug. They knew I was writing the script and they knew we shot the movie, but I knew visually seeing the completed film would be different. Thankfully, they loved it. They were happy to know that the film was truthful and honest. Naturally, it was difficult to watch certain scenes and relive those moments. A few of my family members said seeing themselves portrayed onscreen was like having a

mirror held up to them for the first time. They were able to see themselves as they actually were which, by their own admission, helped them further understand the reasons behind their actions.

XD: To produce the film, you took out loans in addition to the grants you received from Film Independent and Kodak. Within these financial constraints, you budgeted to pay everyone involved the same amount. Why did you make this amazing decision and how did it factor into the camaraderie on the set?

TM: We didn't have a big budget, and we had to pay the actors according to SAG's (Screen Actors' Guild) Low Budget Agreement. While attending Film Independent's Producer's Lab, Morgan came up with the idea to pay the crew based on "most favored nations." We wanted to be fair. **Lee Stiff** (executive producer), Morgan, and I felt that everyone, from the production assistant to the director of photography, would be integral to the production of the film. It was imperative that everyone be paid the same because no one person was above another; we were all in the trenches together. As everyone became emotionally connected to the story, it was amazing to see people voluntarily step outside of their job descriptions to usher this film through production. I often hear directors use the phrase "my film" when, in my opinion, they should say "our film," because they didn't make it alone. I will forever be grateful to every single person who helped bring this film from a dream to fruition.

XD: As the film continues to pick up steam and awards, where do you see it going?

TM: After the film finishes its festival run, we hope to secure traditional distribution or self-distribute it. We aim to use cinema as a means to give marginalized people a voice and shed light on issues that may seem too hard to tackle. We will get this film in front of audiences in a theatrical setting, whether it is through a traditional or non-traditional route. The performances are too impactful, the filmmaking too strong, and the story too important to settle for less.

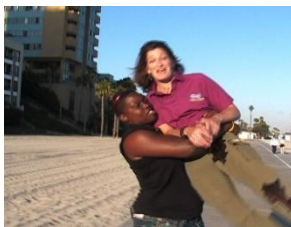

WHAT THE L ??? part 2

Doctor: What became of Jenny's film? Was it a success?

Caller: Good granny, no! She stole the negatives.

Doctor: What? Why?

Caller: Because she's an evil psycho bitch from hell! Thank goddess Tina was able to parlay that into a bigger job in New York.

Doctor: What the—?

Caller: See, the studio takes over, or rather Jenny's assistant director, Adele, who does this total All About Eve takeover of Jenny's life, is made director and changes the ending so that the hets are happy. TAKE YOUR PALATE TO SCHOOL AT **FOOD 101 IN MORINGSIDE**

If English 101 had been anything like Ron Eyester's **Food 101**, maybe I also would have become a chef.

Recently taking over complete ownership of the restaurant, Ron is able to fully showcase his self-taught skills creating foods that speak flavors.



To forget the rainy evening dampness, Jason and Jeff, the masterminds behind the bar, suggested "The Aviator," a blend of Aviation Gin and Lemon-Lavender juice with a splash of Crème de Cassis and fresh lemon. After two of these, I could have been back outside, singing in the rain.

Lizzie, our delightful server, was on a mission to wow us with Ron's creations. To compliment them, she recommended the unfiltered 2007 Foris Pinot Noir from Oregon's Rogue Valley with bright Asian spices, cherries, raspberries and a slight earthy finish.

Ron has a focused passion on how fresh ingredients can play off each other. Tender, long-finned Point Judith Calamari showed sweet silky tastes; no sauce needed here, but pickled fennel and apricot curry took it to a higher level. Another crowd-pleasing appetizer is a southern thing like no other: pimento cheese, house-made with aged Tillamook Cheddar on Semolina toast points. Good stuff!

The off-menu juicy Blackjack Garden Beefsteak tomato salad with Cypress Grove's Midnight Moon Cheese and delicate White Anchovies (alici) showcased the freshest ingredients available. Arugula Salad from Woodland Gardens, married with smoky Benton's bacon, creamy goat cheese from Vermont, and red wine poached Seckel pears with a buttermilk corn dressing is totally mind-boggling.

Ron kicked it up with delicate Jonah Crab Cakes served over sweet corn chow-chow. Delectable seared Georges Bank U-10 scallops served with pineapple infused Carolina gold rice, smoky bacon, and a tomato glaze was perfection. His signature Wild Georgia Shrimp with Riverview Farm grits and tasty Andouille Sausage was over the top. Delicate flavors of sage and caramelized onions with Cremini mushroom's earthiness partnered well with Via Elisa Ravioli and Riverview Farm's braised pork shoulder. Lizzie took us to the limit when she delivered the perfect brunch slider, The Big Nasty: lightly fried Springer Mountain chicken, scrambled local egg, Benton's bacon, and melted cheddar cheese. Outrageous!

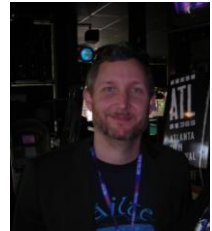
Tempting our taste buds with Ron's desserts was criminal. Chocolate Crepes filled with El Rey ganache were sinful; Homemade Belgian Waffles with Butter Pecan Ice Cream were sensual; and decadent Chocolate Bread Pudding was absolutely blissful.
